### Helium Films USA, LLC Covid-19 Social Distancing Policy

As you return to work in the [midst/wake] of the 2019 novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic, Helium Films USA, LLC wants to assure you of its continued commitment to maintaining a safe and healthy workplace and that we are taking additional measures to protect you, your coworkers, and your families from the spread of COVID-19. As part of those efforts, we are implementing a new Social Distancing Policy. **Please read this policy carefully.**

#### Importance of Social Distancing

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has found that one of the most effective ways of preventing the spread of COVID-19 is limiting face-to-face contact with others, known as social distancing. The Occupational Safety and Health Authority (OSHA) similarly recommends increased social distancing when preparing workplaces to respond to COVID-19.

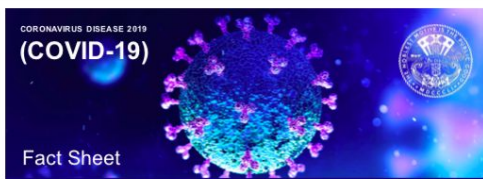
This Social Distancing Policy is a key part of our overall strategy and commitment to maintaining a healthy workplace in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. Although knowledge about the virus and how it spreads are evolving, based on the information we have now, these measures will help curb its spread. Compliance with this policy is essential because current consensus on the virus suggests, among other things, that:

- COVID-19 is highly contagious.
- COVID-19 spreads mostly among people who are in close contact (within about 6 feet, or two arms' lengths) for a prolonged time period (between 10 and 30 minutes, depending on the distance).
- The virus generally spreads when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks, and droplets from their mouth or nose get in the air and land in the mouths or noses of nearby people.
- A person who has the virus may not have any symptoms but may still spread COVID-19.
- A person can get COVID-19 by touching another person, such as with a handshake, or by touching another surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or eyes.
- The virus can live on surfaces for up to several days, depending on the surface and other conditions.

For these reasons, the CDC and other public health experts have recommended limiting contact with other people and common surfaces to limit the spread of

**What is coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)?**  
COVID-19 is a new coronavirus not previously identified in humans. Coronaviruses are a category of viruses normally found in animals, but some can evolve and infect humans. Coronaviruses can infect your nose, sinuses, or upper throat. This specific coronavirus was first identified as the cause of an outbreak of respiratory illness in Wuhan, China in December 2019 and was officially named COVID-19 on February 11, 2020 by the World Health Organization (WHO).

**What are the symptoms of COVID-19?**  
Coronaviruses can cause mild to moderate symptoms like the common cold. Complications and outcomes of COVID-19 are still being investigated. Symptoms of COVID-19 may include:

- Runny nose
- Sore throat
- Headache
- Fever
- Cough
- General feeling of being unwell

**Who is at risk for COVID-19?**  
The health risk from COVID-19 to the general American public may change over time as the situation unfolds. Risk is based on exposure and a variety of factors that may vary, including the community in which you live, places you have visited, interactions you have had, and your line of work.

It is recommended people meeting the following criteria contact their healthcare provider to be evaluated for COVID-19:

- If you have traveled to an area affected by COVID-19 within the last 14 days OR had close contact with a person confirmed to have COVID-19.

#### AND

- Developed a fever and symptoms of respiratory illness, such as a cough or shortness of breath.

**How is coronavirus spread?**  
Human coronaviruses like COVID-19 are most commonly spread from an infected person to others through:

- Close contact (within 6 feet/2 meters);
- Respiratory droplets from a person coughing or sneezing;
- Close personal contact, such as touching or shaking hands; and
- Touching an object or surface with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes before washing your hands.

#### What should I do if I think I have been exposed to COVID-19?

If you have had close contact (within 6 feet/2 meters) with someone who is confirmed to have, or is being evaluated for COVID-19 infection, you should:

- Monitor your health starting from the day you first had close contact with the person and continue for 14 days after you last had close contact with the person.

- Watch for these signs and symptoms:
  - Fever of 100.4 F/38 C or higher – take your temperature twice a day;
  - Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing;
  - Coughing;
  - Other early symptoms to watch for are chills, body aches, sore throat, headache, diarrhea, nausea/vomiting, and runny nose.
- If you develop fever or any of these symptoms, call your healthcare provider right away and let them know about your recent travel or exposure and symptoms.

- Signage posting a copy of the Safe Reopening Plan at each public entrance to the facility.

#### B. Measures To Protect Employee Health (Mandatory):

- Teleworking opportunities have been maximized.
- All employees have been told not to come to work if sick.
- All employees must have temperature taken upon reporting to work; if 100 degrees or more, should not be allowed in workplace. If a thermometer is not available, employees must be screened for symptoms (cough, shortness of breath or trouble breathing); or at least two of the following: fever, chills, repeated shivering with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, new loss of taste or smell)
- All employees must wear facial coverings in the workplace, if within six feet of others.
- All desks or individual workstations are separated by at least six feet.
- Break rooms, bathrooms, and other common areas are being disinfected frequently, on the following schedule:  
**Every 2h.**

- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) has been provided at a level appropriate to employee job duties (describe below)

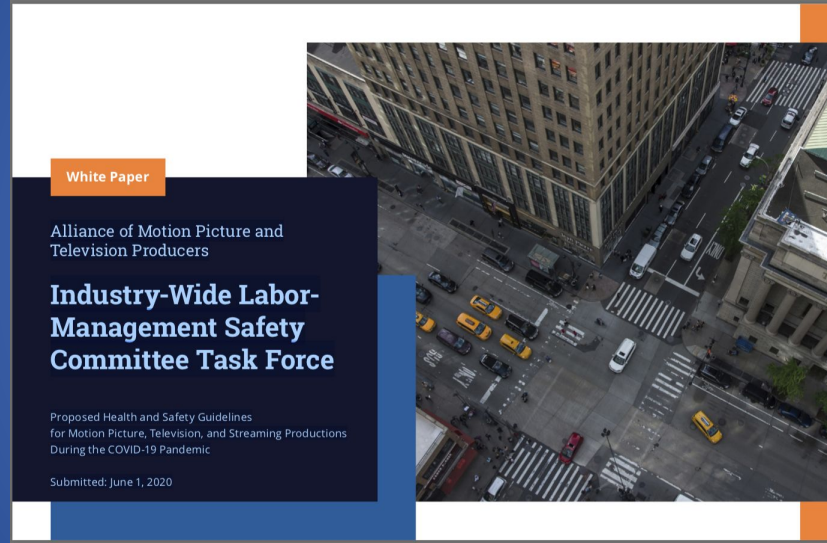

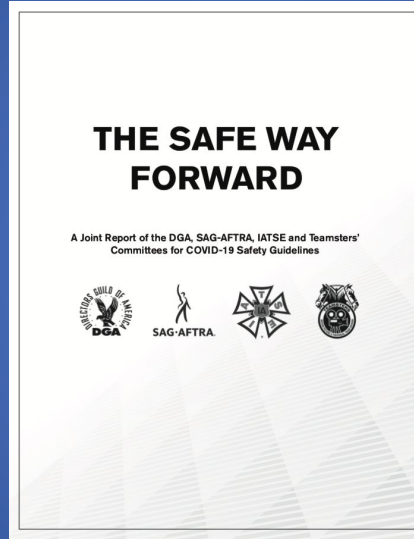

# City of San Diego Filming Guidelines (6/9/20)

 **Supplemental Guidelines on Film/Still Photography Permitting and COVID-19 Prevention**  
As of 6/9/2020

**Overview**  
The City of San Diego understands the need for studios, production companies, agencies, and crew members to return to work with the goal of mitigating and preventing the spread of COVID-19 for cast, crew, support services, and the public.


The City of San Diego's current policy on film and still photography production is in line with the County of San Diego's Public Health Orders, California Department of Public Health guidelines, and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines. It is the responsibility of the production company, its crew members, contractors, vendors, and other representatives to be aware of and comply with guidelines as they are issued.

This policy direction is current as of June 9, 2020, but may change subject to our continuing adoption of public health guidance to ensure measures to mitigate and prevent the spread of COVID-19 are followed. Deviations from proposed plans, perceived risk to public health, and to our public safety resources will result in suspension of the film/still photography production.

**Guidelines**  
The City of San Diego will begin processing permits for film and still photography productions on City of San Diego public right-of-ways on a case-by-case basis provided the productions comply with the following guidelines:

- All productions must complete the County of San Diego's [Safe Reopening Plan](#), prominently post the completed plan on-set, and distribute copies to all cast, crew, and individuals that will be on-set.
- The order prohibiting social gatherings does not apply to workers supporting the entertainment industries, studios, and other related establishments as they have been identified as an essential service, but there must be more than enough space for a minimum 6' physical distancing for all talent and crewmembers within the film or photography shoot footprint. Therefore, the City is requiring a cap of cast/crew within a defined area: a **maximum group of 15 on location** will be considered based on footprint size. The cap may be smaller or larger pending review of submitted request.
- All cast, crew, extras, and audience members must wear a face covering while on location. An exception will be made for on-camera talent only while actively being filmed or photographed, provided all other individuals are a minimum 6' physical distance from talent.
- Productions must make accommodations for hand washing and/or sanitation stations on set available for all cast/crew.
- All cast, crew, extras, and audience members must maintain a minimum 6' physical distance from each other at all times.
- All productions on public and private property must comply with County of San Diego's Public Health Orders, California Department of Public Health guidelines, and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines.

**Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)**

- 1. Are film/still photography permits being processed at this time?**  
Yes, provided productions comply with the guidelines detailed on the previous page and with county, state, and federal guidance. Please plan for longer processing times for permit requests (up to five business days for low-impact filming/still photography that does not involve City/public safety staffing).
- 2. Do these guidelines also apply for film or still photography production on private property?**  
Yes, however, the City of San Diego does not process film permit requests for private property unless filming activity involves public safety hazards or ancillary use of public property. Productions taking place on private property must still comply with county, state, and federal guidelines.
- 3. Can I request posting for no-parking to support my shoot?**  
Posting for no-parking requests will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Productions will be asked to request the bare minimum quantity of parking spaces for essential production vehicles needed to support the film/still photography shoot (not to exceed six (6) parking spaces) to mitigate negative impacts to businesses that are re-opening and/or offering outside pick-up. A detailed scale parking/traffic diagram, identifying the requested parking spaces, street names (including nearest cross streets), and surrounding businesses/properties will be required, in addition to completion of the required Good Neighbor Outreach process.
- 4. Can I request a street or sidewalk closure as part of my filming activity?**  
Street, sidewalk, and right-of-way closure requests will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.
- 5. Can I request a film permit for a City of San Diego park, beach, pier, library, or lake?**  
Film and still photography requests for City of San Diego parks, beaches, piers, libraries, and lakes that are closed to the public or open only for limited activity will not be processed at this time. For specific locations that are open for permitting activities, on-site City or public safety staffing may be required and hourly staffing fees may apply. To inquire about a specific location, send an email to [film@sandiego.gov](mailto:film@sandiego.gov).
- 6. I'm interested in participating in an all-hands production/roundtable meeting to discuss my production. How can I schedule this?**  
Accommodations will be made to host preliminary discussions and/or production meetings via video/web conference. To request a video/web meeting, please send an email request to [film@sandiego.gov](mailto:film@sandiego.gov).
- 7. Is there any expected date for full re-opening of film permitting without restrictions or additional guidelines?**  
The City of San Diego does not yet have a timeline for expanded permitting services at this time. Please check back frequently at <https://www.sandiego.gov/specialevents-filming> for updates.

  - State defers to individual counties and jurisdictions for specific guidelines and restrictions, EXCEPT...
    - Production/back office staff and management must comply with the State's Office Workplace Guidelines
- County of San Diego
  - Must comply with the County of San Diego's Safe Reopening Plan
    - Broad COVID-19 safety protocols checklist for all essential businesses operating during the pandemic, including film, TV, music, and photography productions
    - What You'll Need To Do:
      - Complete the Safe Reopening Plan for all of your filming locations
      - Post or have a copy of the completed Safe Reopening Plan accessible on-set
      - Provide a copy to all cast, crew, and individuals that will be on-set
      - If applying for a County, City, or Port film permit, provide a copy to their respective permit offices as part of your permit application packet

  - Film, TV, commercial, and still photography productions must comply with the following:
    - County of San Diego's Safe Reopening Plan (completed/signed copy must be provided to permit office if requesting to film on public property)
      - If filming on private property, Safe Reopening Plan must be completed, posted or made easily accessible on-set, and provided to all cast/crew. Production does *not* need to submit the Safe Reopening Plan to the City or County.
    - Physical distancing for all talent, crew and support services
    - Facial coverings required (exception for on-camera talent while actively being filmed)
    - Handwashing/sanitation stations
    - Cast/crew limit of 15 per location
      - Considerations for an exception: Location/venue provides adequate space to physical distance, use of pods or zones in separate locations (e.g. basecamp), surrounding community

I further understand and agree that COVID-19 is worldwide and that in the event I do contract COVID-19, I may have been exposed to the virus in ways other than by participating in the Production.
2. I represent and warrant that (a) I will truthfully and honestly complete the health questionnaire that will be provided to me; (b) in the past fourteen (14) days, I have had no symptoms generally associated with COVID-19, I have not tested positive for COVID-19, I have not been identified as a carrier of COVID-19, nor have I been in close contact (e.g., within six (6) feet for a prolonged period of time or having direct contact with infectious secretions) with any person who has tested positive for COVID-19, has displayed any of the symptoms generally associated with COVID-19 or has been identified as a carrier of COVID-19; and (c) I have not had a fever (of 100.4°F or greater) within the past seventy-two (72) hours without the use of medicine that reduces fever.
3. In order to promote my own safety and the safety of others who are involved in the Production, I agree that while I am at the Location or otherwise performing services, I shall follow all guidelines provided by the Production Company and Agency, including the following:
  - a. I will wear a mask and gloves whenever possible;

### COVID-19 Protocols

In order to ensure the safety of all our crew and clients due to the Covid-19 virus we have prepared the protocols below that will be in effect for all of our productions. We understand that our collective understanding of the virus is evolving and as we learn more about it, the protections that we put in place for everyone may also change. Our intent and goals are to create as safe a work environment as we can for everyone involved in the production and that includes the general public who we interact with during both the prep, wrap and execution phases of each shoot. We often are renting space for a specific location and the needs and safety of the individuals that own, work and/or live in those spaces must also be taken into consideration. Please read through the protocols below, familiarize yourself with them and then sign at the bottom and return to the Production Team to acknowledge that you will follow them throughout the production. Maintaining the health and safety of everyone is our priority – looking forward to a great safe shoot together!

#### GENERAL PRACTICES

- You should avoid touching your mouth, eyes, and nose.
- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Utilize PPE, including but not limited to face coverings that cover the nose and mouth, gloves, etc., as needed or required.
- Replace your PPE as necessary.
- You should maintain social distance of a minimum of 6 feet whenever possible.
- Work with the Producer and Department Heads to follow proper sanitary guidelines.
- Limit your time on set and around groups of people to only when necessary.
- Maintain regular housekeeping practices in your immediate space, including routine cleaning and disinfecting of surfaces, equipment, and other elements of the work environment.

You will find a Health Questionnaire as part of our protocol/guidelines. Please complete it immediately upon receipt and return to the Covid Compliance Officer via email.

Should you have 2 or more symptoms 2 days prior, we will not be able to allow you to work to ensure the safety of your colleagues.

Production will have a Covid Compliance Officer on set to ensure the safety of all Crew/Talent/Agency/Client. They will check in all crew at the start of the workday and perform a health assessment (per below). This Team will additionally provide PPE to all personnel as needed and continuously perform disinfection and wipe down on the set throughout the day. They will monitor mask wearing, social distancing, congregation of personnel in each room/space and any other tasks that is needed related to Covid-19 remediation. Please follow their instructions and guidance as it is in everyone's best interest as we employ best practices. If anyone does not follow their guidance they will be dismissed from the set and terminated.
